Dear Karin (Salomon),

President John Issa received the following from David Warther of David Warther & Co., regarding Mammoth Ivory. It is urgent that you take a minute, review the document and visit the website listed to post a comment. If this is written into CITES, it will end any trade in Mammoth ivory, teeth and skeletons. "The member Nations signatory to the Convention of International Trade of Endangered Species (CITES) will meet in Sri Lanka, May 23 to June 3, 2019. Israel and Kenya have submitted a proposal to declare the Woolly Mammoth an endangered species by placing it into Appendix II. Appendix II species are not necessarily threatened with extinction, but their trade must be controlled. In this case, the danger stems from Mammoth's "look-alike" status to African elephant ivory opening the way for "laundering" or mislabeling

of elephant ivory.

I am asking that you follow the links and make a comment before the April 22, 2019 deadline on the issue of mammoths.

You may be for or against this proposal but if it passes there will be no trade in ancient mammoth ivory. Here is what my public comment read for whatever it is worth:

"As a citizen of the USA and as a worker in fossil mammoth ivory I would like it made known that I am opposed to the classification of the ancient mammoth as an endangered or threatened species as set forth in a proposal in the upcoming CITES meeting. The idea of ancient mammoth ivory being a "look alike" material to elephant ivory that can thereby be utilized as a cover for the trade of illegal elephant ivory is not a reasonable concept."

This same concept, if taken seriously, will include high grade plastics that look like ivory. I work in a man made plastic that looks much more like real elephant ivory than does any of the mammoth ivory I work in. Are they going to list petroleum as composed of endangered species as well? The same logic that proposes that mammoths be listed would insist that petroleum be listed as well for it is from petroleum that the highest grade imitation ivory plastics are made.

The plastic I use has been stopped twice in the past year by USFWS agents who were certain it was real ivory. In over 30 years of working mammoth ivory I have never seen USFWS or any other agency mistake mammoth ivory for elephant ivory.

There was a hearing in Washington March 13th, 2019 for public comment on this and other CITES changes. The United States Fish and Wildlife (USFW) is now deciding their position on this and all other proposals.

USFW has already decided that an extinct animal can be legally listed as CITES Appendix II. The comments most helpful will be those that point out substantive issues. Please state facts on the issues and how it could personally affect you.

Public Comments will be accepted until April 22, 2019. Steps to take if you want to comment:

- 2) Paste in this docket information FWS-HQ-IA-2017-0079
- 3) Place your comments there.

SANDING DISKS

One of my favorite flexshaft tools that saves a lot of time is the snap-on sanding disk. I mainly use the medium and fine grits but sometimes like the very fine ones sold for working with platinum.

Ordinarily, you'd think of placing the disk on the mandrel with the grit side facing away from your hand, but notice that you end up with your elbow up in the air. Instead, try flipping the disk so that the grit side is towards your hand. It's a much more comfortable position because the elbow is down near your side, and it lets me hold the work up close where I have a better view of what I'm sanding.

I use these snap-on disks so frequently that I keep multiple mandrels with different grits already mounted in the bur stand. Some mandrels have the grit facing out and some facing in.







USING THE SANDING DISKS

EASIER PRONG SETTING

When setting stones in a prong mount, the tool is less likely to slip off the prong if you grind a groove into its face or rough up the face a bit with sandpaper. Some folks prefer a prong pusher for doing this, and others like a set of pliers.

The easiest way to create a slot on the pusher is with a file,

and the easiest way to create a slot on one jaw of your pliers is with a cutoff wheel. Then do a rough polish on the slot with a medium grit, knife-edge silicone wheel.

FROM THE EDITOR: THE PROSPECTOR, 2019

To all CVGMS members:

For various reasons, The Prospector was published only very intermittently last year. However, the fact is that each year fewer and fewer members submit photos or articles about their travels to shows, collecting specimen, gem/jewelry projects, and so on. It may be that since so many older members are no longer with us, the degree of dedication

to our hobby is less than it was in the past, especially in regards to many of the newer members.

When I took on the job of being editor of our newsletter (now some 14 years ago!) I did it with the understanding that I would not simply print a "cut and paste" newsletter, depending on the work of those in other clubs and other sources for appropriate material, but would instead try to incorporate articles and photos mainly from our own membership; obviously as few such submittals have been made in the recent past, especially, it is difficult to continue to put out the club newsletter with nothing to publish!

I have a possible solution to this problem, as well as to the problem of putting out a quality newsletter each month, not only in online form, but in printed form as well.

Trust me, it's a fairly time-consuming task; I estimate that each regular issue of The Prospector takes me about 2 full days of my time, to compose, assemble (particularly photographs!), then re-write, prepare for printing (paper edition), print, collate, staple, fold, address, stamp & take to the post office.

So, this is what I propose: to adopt a quarterly newsletter, which would an issue for each season: Winter, Spring, Summer and Fall. That would give the members enough time after trips or projects to collate their photos, possibly write up their recent experiences they wish to share, and so on.

As for the newsletter being a notice of upcoming meetings, as well as sending items of interest to the membership- such as up coming lectures, activities of the BLM, items for sale, and so on, this is best done- especially in a timely manner- by internet. To this end, several members, including Janis, Talma, Karin, Matt and Barb, and Andrea, and others on occasion, have been most helpful and very, very much appreciated!

The last question we should resolve is whether to continue publishing The Prospector not only online (as I have been doing) as well as paper printing and mailing, or simply have an online-only publication?

As for costs, the cost to publish online is of course zero, but to print and mail each issue is of course somewhat expensive, even though the cost of labor is zero. Print cartridges, especially color ones, are expensive; I have in recent years paid for paper myself (which isn't that much) but then there's the cost of mailing; a one-ounce issue of The Prospector-that is, five $8 \frac{1}{2} \times 11$ sheets, to nearly 55 addresses, costs over \$30 to send out; a year's worth now costs over \$330. An even larger edition would cost more, of course.

Anyway, if The Prospector is to become a quarterly issue, it would be expected that it would consist (hopefully!) of more than ten pages, including the front & rear cover. Very easy to do online, quite a bit more complicated to do for a print version, in order to get as much as possible to fit onto each page.

What are your thoughts, please?

- 1. Do you like the idea of a quarterly Prospector?
- 2. Do you think an online version-only would be OK, with "news items" of timely interest (upcoming lectures, meetings, items for sale, etc.) being forwarded to me & sent out ASAP online?
- 3. Would you personally be willing to commit to submitting an item or items for The Prospector at least once or twice a year...? Doesn't matter what, anything will help. This is important!

Please give this some thought, and get back to me with your thoughts at your earliest convenience.

A LETTER

Hi - I don't know the author of this article, but it's full of information Karin

Hello,

It's been awhile and I had a little time on my hands, so I thought the group might be interested in an update on what is occurring in and around Topaz Mountain, UT and finding red beryl. I have led numerous trips for mineral clubs, including the NW Federation out there to collect topaz and red beryl for several years now. I recently took my family and kids out there for a day during Spring Break, which is the first time I have been out there in well over a year. It has changed rather dramatically.

-- Materion (Brush Wellman) has started mining again in the Spor Mountain area west of Topaz Mountain, so the road out to it is in very good. Also, a group recently purchased the former U of Utah claims on the east side of the "cove," so the dirt roads in the area have also been improved. They are running a fee dig for topaz with different costs depending on whether you want to dig after a blast, have a guide, or just go out there yourself. You do get nice topaz there, but the rock is very hard. Although they took part of a free dig area away, they have made some improvements to the overall area.

Many of the popular dig areas, especially the 2 main red beryl areas have dramatically changed. Several individuals appear to be out there nearly 24 hours/day and nearly every day. It also appears they have been using some equipment that might not be authorized. I have been approached several times to buy red beryl from their finds (and for much more than retail). I recently went up there and noticed that it is almost a sheer wall of rock now. Considerable work and multiple individuals are required to make any real progress and get to some of the softer rock where the red beryls are located. The area is also a lot more dangerous than before with some large hanging rocks in places undercut by holes and diggings along with tight and deep seams. There was a rather recent death in this area due to this. I did find a few of the vents, but they are very tough and tight to get to.

The increased work, thoroughness, and the little progress that can now be made appears to have made it much more difficult to find red beryl. Typically, you can find several of them in the tailings below the main zones. All you had to do is break up the softer rock and have a good eye. Previously it was rather easy to find 10-20 red beryls without a lot of effort, but this no longer seems to be the case. I only found a few like this in that area and my kids and wife only found one. I found the others directly in the main area by breaking some rocks that hadn't yet been looked at. Overall, I was only able to find 6-7 total in about 5-6 hours, which is much less than any other time I've been out there. However, I also rarely screen for the loose crystals anymore which is a good way to find more.

The surrounding area has also been more developed. Searle Canyon (western side of Thomas Range behind the cove) is now operating as a rather inexpensive fee dig area for larger red beryls. Rather cheap, but it requires some hard work. There are now 4 pits there with pit 3 being the most productive and pit 4 having the largest beryls. I've been there twice

and have found several red beryls with multiple bixbyites on them, a red beryl attached to a topaz and to a garnet pseudomorph, a red beryl with 8+ more beryl crystals coming out of it, and even a red beryl with a holfertite crystal coming out of it (see Mindat). The same group is also operating the Solar Wind claim on the north side of the range. I have been fortunate to find some very large and well formed bixbyite with topaz there (with permission).

The Maynard Claim area, previously operated by Collector's Edge, is in the process of being redeveloped for specimens. A group has an investor and is in the process of starting up. The topaz from here is world famous and hasn't been seen since the 80s.

The famous Violet Claims in the Wah Wah Mountains are still in a state of flux after Rex Harris' death. Additionally, the main operator of the other red beryl mine above this has passed. Both deposits are apparently still for sale although the price I was told was astronomical and well above what I think could be made profitable. Some of the normal players are interested but also seem to have the same view. A considerable amount of development would need to be done in this very remote area. Also, last year, Tina, the owner, was held up in her house and all the red beryls in the house (Harris' house) were stolen. Most were recovered by a friend of mine in Salt Lake when the perpetrators tried to sell him some. We would love this to become a fee dig site, which I think could be a money maker, but so far no takers.

If you are ever up here and want a trip to this area or others (Tintic, Gold Hill, etc.), feel free to contact me. Thanks.
