

I thought they might also be of interest to your Carmel Valley club. A couple sample tips are included below. Feel free to use them in your club newsletter. They make fresh content and are handy when you need to fill a little extra space. And if you'd like to receive more jewelry tips each month, just have your editor get in touch. REMOVING A STONE FROM BEZEL SETTING:

If you've forgotten to use dental floss and got your stone caught in a bezel, there's one thing you can try before starting to pry. Find some sticky wax or beeswax. Roll it into a pencil-sized cylinder and stick the end onto the top of the stone. Mold it on well and yank. If all else fails, you either have to very carefully pry open the bezel with a sharp knife blade or drill a small hole in back of the stone and push it out with the point of a scribe.

MAKING YOUR OWN MOKUME:

FOREDOM STAND:

A quick and easy way to suspend a Foredom over your jewelry bench is to use some steel pipe components from your local hardware store. It attaches with a couple screws and costs a little over \$10. I use 1/2 inch galvanized pipe and fittings. To build a stand that attaches to the top of your bench, all you'll need is a flange and a thirty inch length of the pipe. If you prefer a stand that attaches to the side of your bench, you'll need a little longer pipe, three foot, a flange, and a 90 degree "street elle". Finally, make a hook that goes into the top of the pipe to hang the motor from. You can use heavy coat hanger wire or better yet, a 1/8 steel rod from the hardware store.

BALL BURRS:

I use ball burrs quite a bit for carving and for cleaning up bits of solder that need to be removed. Ball burrs seem to be more controllable than other cutting burrs. They're less apt to grab and walk over your piece leaving nasty scars. And I've found that size matters. The large 8-10 millimeter size is a useful size for carving off bulk material while the small half millimeter or less size can be used at high speed for signing your name on the back of the piece.

CLEANING STEEL SHOT:

Steel shot in a vibratory or rotary tumbler works great to burnish up your finished silver pieces. Surfaces are shined and hardened by the shot impinging on it. Carbon steel shot can get rusty and even stainless steel can develop a blackish coating that's hard to remove. My solution of choice to clean the shot is Classic Coke. Just pour an ounce or two over the shot and let the tumbler run for an hour or so. A bad case might require a second cleaning. I'm no chemist, but I've heard that it's the phosphoric acid in Coke that does the trick. While you're waiting for the shot to clean up, just settle back and enjoy the rest of the Coke.

DEBURRING A HOLE:

When you drill a hole, there's usually a burr produced on the underside of the metal. Typically you would then file or sand this smooth, but doing so will put scratches on your piece that will take

time to polish off. A quick way to remove the burr is to grab a drill that's about three times as large as your hole. Simply twist it in the hole to cut off the burr. I usually do this by hand but it you have many holes to do, put the drill into a holder like a pin vice.

CFMS ANNUAL FALL MEETING, Visalia, November 11 & 12, '11

I represented the Carmel Valley Mineral and Gem Society at the annual fall meeting in Visalia. Friday evening a "Cracker Barrel" type of meeting was held as a sort of "ice breaker" for the many clubs that were represented. Jim Brace-Thompson, CMS president, hosted the evening, his entertaining style helped first timers as well as representatives of the committees ease into asking questions and general networking.

Saturday, early 8 am, Jim held a meeting for first time attendees. 9 am and the fall meeting commenced with

lst timers introducing themselves. The agenda was closely followed and meeting adjourned at 12 noon. There are many committees and each gave a short synopsis of what happened/will happen. 72 local clubs were represented.

One of the main topics was the fact that local federation directors are not disseminating information to their club members. CFMS offers a lot of information to the local level, and many members are completely unaware of the state organization. It is also important for the local directors to attend at least one of the two state meetings a year. There is information on collecting sites, land access, lapidary camps, junior activities, field trips, video and speaker programs, demonstrators, to name a few.

One topic that was brought up: it is important for each local club to compile a Policies and Procedures Manual. Many clubs have these and it helps to keep the club on track. A show manual is another important tool. Apparently there are many problems associated with personality conflicts and other interpersonal relations that detract from Club goals and activities. Each time, part of the problem was identified as the lack of policies and procedures which would have addressed the issues in question in advance.

Again, this year a free space to Camp Paradise will be raffled off. Several clubs are also offering a free space to a lucky member and in return they are to give a show and tell report of what they learned.

I personally have attended Camp Paradise and Zzyzx for about 5 years and have met many capable teachers, networked with other club members and had a rewarding experience learning new techniques. Camp Paradise is held in September and Zzyzx during spring vacation for CSFullerton.

North Bay Field Trips presented both CFMS (www.cfmsinc.org) and AFMS (amfed.org) Scholarship and Endowment Funds each with a \$375 donation.

The upcoming 2012 CFMS show will be held in Riverside and Ventura -Oxnard will host the 2013 show at the Ventura Fairgrounds. Many of the local clubs passed out flyers for their 2012 shows.

Jim gave a juniors report and he was very happy that 5 juniors installed cases at the annual show in Anderson. There is a junior badge program - please go to <u>cfmsinc.org</u> for more information. Click on the newsletter to read Jim's column.

Saturday afternoon CFMS hosted an ALAA and PLAC meeting with a state congress representative and Kim Campbell and Amy giving the latest information. Amy is working on an ADA law suit. Shirley Leeson sold T-Shirts and jackets and passed out Rockhound Activist window stickers. Orange net trash bags is an idea being developed to collect trash on BLM property. Hoping this will help rock hounds be in better graces with state and federal agencies as well as clean up the desert and other landscapes of unwanted garbage.

Both ALAA and PLAC have joined forces with the Blue Ribbon Collation, NAMC and CORVA, California off-road Vehicle Association - www.corva.org. Joining forces make a more influential statement,
